A Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parent/Guardian

As we approach Christmas, there is a sense of excitement and anticipation building with so many events still to come this week for us to look forward to. As usual we have our traditional Christmas services in St. Michael's and All Angels Church in Croston for all our year groups, a chance to look beyond the many good things that we are fortunate to enjoy at this time of year and reflect on the real message of Christmas, the birth of our Saviour, Jesus, who was born for us, that we may have life. For many around the world there is hardship, homelessness, famine and on-going war or civil strife and it is right that we include these people in our prayers and think of their daily suffering. It is right too that we do more than this. As in previous years, we have had a Christmas Appeal and this year it has been to support The Brick in Wigan. The Brick Project is a small project that delivers big results for the community it serves. It offers services to people who are homeless, in poverty or facing debt crisis. As its name suggests, it provides a safe, solid building block for people in crisis to begin to construct a new life and become valuable members of society. Our students have given generously in the form of food, toiletries and unneeded clothing to support this appeal and we have a non-uniform day on the last day of the term to raise funds for the project. Along with all the wonderful items donated for the Operation Christmas Child shoe-box collection, the kindness represented by these gifts are hugely appreciated by their recipients and really can make a difference.

Once again, our students and staff have been working hard across all year groups since September, and for Year 11 in particular, the recent mock GCSE examinations and the handing out of mock results has provided affirmation to many that they are on the right track. For some there will be a period of reflection and realisation of the need to really engage in class and in homework for the remainder of Year 11. Looking ahead to August 2018, we hope as many of our students as possible will be celebrating the fruits of their hard work, but in the meantime, it is our responsibility to challenge everybody to constantly improve and achieve the best that they can. Integral to this is excellent attendance and we will continue to challenge year groups and individual students where appropriate to be in school as much as is possible. Right up to the end of the term, school has been going full steam ahead to progress all of our students.

On the teaching side we said goodbye to Miss Alston, who left us in November for a promoted post at Parklands after 11 years of outstanding service as a teacher of Science. Miss Morris has also left us, temporarily, on maternity leave, at the start of December, and we wish her the very best in the last days of her pregnancy. Her place in Maths is taken by Mrs Whitton. Mrs Jenkins from the Modern Foreign Languages department leaves us at the end of term having provided us with sterling service. We wish all of them well. Bishop Rawstorne is staffed not just by the teachers, but a large team of dedicated and committed support staff who are integral to the day-to-day life of the school. Without them, we would not enjoy the success that has long been a part of the school. At the start of December we said farewell to John Twinn, who took a well-deserved retirement from his post as Technology Technician after 9 years of loyal and faithful service at the school. Highly popular with the staff, he will be much missed. In his place comes Mrs Jane Cogley who will be starting with us in January.

Now though is a time to stop, relax, have some fun and leave Bishop Rawstorne behind us until the New Year. For us all, next year will be a year of new challenges as we strive to improve and progress. I would like to wish all of our students, staff, parents and governors a happy and restful Christmas and look forward to seeing you all in 2018.

### Future Events

#### Salters' Chemistry Festival at Manchester University

During the day, students are required to compete in the Salters' Challenge against other schools from the North of England. During this challenge, students are required to work under strict lab rules whilst being constantly observed by a variety of judges.

## Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge.

This year, all of Year 8 took part in the Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge. The Challenge (sponsored by the University of Oxford and Google) is organised in over 40 countries, and is designed to get students all over the world excited about computing. Over the course of 40 minutes, students are put through their paces; having to solve a series of increasingly complex computational thinking puzzles. This year over 70,000 students from across the UK partook in the same challenge as our Year 8s. We are pleased to announce that 51 students placed in the top 25% of the country, with an amazing 23 of those students placing in the top 10%. These 23 students will go on to partake in a further challenge in March. The overall winner, with a score of 157 out of 200, was Millie Atherton. Congratulations Millie!



## STUDENT COUNCIL

This year the Student Council elections were held in a different way and for the first time applications were requested before the Election Day. The calibre of applications was very impressive and the selection for the final candidates to go to election was very close. Following the elections we have a very enthusiastic council this year. ## PASTORAL NEWS

### THE APP

Thanks for your support over the launch of the new SIMS app. 730 parents are now on the app and 830 students so we really appreciate your efforts with regards to getting everything set up. If you are on you will be familiar with everything that it can do, and you will be becoming more acquainted with the alerts that it sends through. We are now piloting a range of behaviour and achievement alerts that will become standard practice in January. We are looking at you being informed with regards to missed homeworks and behaviour issues, but also being given the positive news of awards and achievement points. As I have said before it is a year of transition, for staff as well as students and over the next term we will be speaking to students and parents to gather feedback to see how we can use the system better.

### REWARDS

Linked to the news about the APP can I also alert you and your young people to the fact that the reward system is now up and running again. Trying to reward 900 students in a meaningful way is an ongoing challenge, and this year we have taken the conscious decision to recognise achievement points rather than a cumulative total of achievement minus behaviour points. This means that more young people should be able to claim their rewards, and following Christmas rewards will be distributed twice a week at break time. This will be displayed prominently around the school. Please encourage your child to come to collect their rewards.



### ATTENDANCE

It's been, overall, a good term for attendance, and I thank parents as always for your continued support on this very important issue. As a school we are as understanding as we are allowed to be with regards to absences, but can I please reiterate that any medical appointment cards, prescription details (photographs etc....) can be used as evidence to support authorised time off. 
